EXHIBITION

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

TRAVELLER COLLECTION

The project seeks to open a dialogue around what an appropriate approach to integrating the narrative of Traveller History into the 'National Project' might look like. Headed by artist Seamus Nolan the project is engaging in a collaborative process of enquiry with cultural practitioners, activists and archivists in an exploration of contested histories to examine examine basic notions of representations in relation to Traveller culture and heritage.

Looking at the archives and collections of agencies such as the National Folklore archives in UCD, The Irish Film Institute,The Irish Travelling People Collection at the Ulster University, Jordanstown, is a unique collection of material covering all aspects of the Travellers' way of life, values and customs. The Collection was assembled by Aileen L'Amie, of the University of Ulster School of Education, The Traditional Music Archives, The Hugh Lane Gallery, The National Photographic archives. To build a collection / database of objects, publications, photography, paintings etc relating to Traveller culture in Traveller collections, State collections and individual collections.



Call out to Traveller agencies to participate in the project, to contribute to the database, and to take part in the workshops to devise the framework for a Travellers Museum, what it would contain and how it would be managed.

Facilitating discussion and research around the different issues that a Traveller's Archive coming into being might present and invite interpretation as to what a future Travellers' Archive might look like through a series of collaborative workshops.

COLLECTIONS

The collections of material which exist to portray Traveller culture are two fold, material produced by Traveller agencies and material produced by non-travellers who have observed and documented Traveller culture at a remove. Traveller Collection seeks to present this material in one place, to collect cultural and historical material relating to Traveller identity.

An online data base, www.travellercollection.ie is open to submissions from anybody and should be moderated and curated by Travellers from around the country. The project will work to compile the huge resources such as the publications and studies carried out by Traveller agencies along with collections of literature, academic studies, folklore commissions, and collections in one place.

REPRESENTATION

With no representation in schools curriculum, with 1 in 100 Travellers entering third level education, with suicide rates 7 times the national average, and life expectancy almost 15 years lower than the national average, is the model of a museum, as a fixed site, as a fixed story of culture an appropriate model for presenting Traveller culture.

With a history of misrepresentation, exclusion and forced assimilation how does this material which forms the basis of Traveller related collections enter the public sphere without prejudice?

Traveller history and culture is a diverse and complex subject, there is not one story to define Traveller identity, but many. There is not one Traveller community but many communities. There is not one site where Traveller culture is located but many.
